## ADRI awarded Cancer Institute NSW Premier's Award for the 2014 Excellence in Translational Cancer Research

The Cancer Institute NSW Premier's Awards for Outstanding Cancer Research is an annual event that celebrates excellence and innovation in cancer research. Seven awards were presented on Friday, 22 August 2014, to those leading the way in their field.

A/Prof. Glen Reid, from the Asbestos Disease Research Institute, accepted the '2014 Excellence in Translational Cancer Research Award' (\$20,000) – on behalf of an ADRI led team including:

- EnGenelC Ltd
- Royal Prince Alfred Hospital
- Strathfield Private Hospital
- Royal North Shore Hospital
- Concord Repatriation General Hospital

The multidisciplinary team of scientists, clinicians and biotech experts from the six organisations investigating malignant pleural mesothelioma (MPM), used tumour samples stored in the ADRI mesothelioma biobank, one of Australia's largest repositories of such samples, to identify a consistent change in how a particular family of genes work in MPM that, when corrected, stops the cancer cells growing. This research has been rapidly brought to a clinical trial stage, in less than three years. The MesomiR-I trial is the first to focus on MPM and Non-Small Cell Lung Cancer (NSCLC), for which few treatment options exist. The trial represents a new approach to therapy for these cancers.

## Treasurer visits Concord's Medical Research Institutes

The Federal Treasurer, The Hon. Joe Hockey MP, accompanied by Mr Craig Laundy, Federal MP for Reid, visited Concord Hospital's medical research institutes on the 10<sup>th</sup> June 2014.

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Mr Hockey was given an overview of the research conducted on the Concord Campus and a vision for future development by Dr Teresa Anderson, Chief Executive of the Sydney Local Health District.

Professor Hart, Head of the Denritic Cell Biology and Therapeutics Group at Anzac Research Institute explained a new method to treat cancer, such as leukaemia. Professor van Zandwijk discussed the progress of ADRI's clinical trial of a novel therapy for malignant

mesothelioma; and Professor Le Couteur, Director of CERA (Centre for Education and Research on Ageing), outlined their research on nutrition, ageing and cancer.

The Treasurer noted that: "This is exactly why we need the Medical Research Fund, so we can put a billion dollars a year into institutes like this which are at the forefront of global technology and development. He went on to say: "I want Australia to become the global hub of medical research."

## Professor Nico van Zandwijk signs MoU between the ADRI and the Institute of Industrial Ecological Sciences, University of Occupational and Environmental Health, Japan

Whilst attending the 21<sup>st</sup> Asian Conference on Occupation Health in Fukuoka City, Japan at the end of August, Professor van Zandwijk had the opportunity to formalize the collaboration and sharing of information on scientific topics relating to asbestos-related diseases with the Institute of Industrial Ecological Sciences, University of Occupational and Environmental Health, (IIES, UOEH) established in Kitakyushu City, Japan. The MoU will formalise a closer collaboration and combine efforts to promote the common research aims and exchange of information between these institutes.




### Update on Andrew Chamberlin

## ADRI's Mesothelioma Support Coordinator



**Jocelyn McLean** has been employed by ADRI as our Mesothelioma Support Coordinator to address the needs of patients with malignant mesothelioma and supporting their carers.

Jocelyn has worked for many years at Royal Prince Alfred Hospital providing information, care and support for the patients who had radical extra-pleural pneumonectomy (EPP) by Associate Professor Brian McCaughan for

mesothelioma. In that role, Jocelyn explored and reported on the recovery of the patients and the needs of their carers. She developed a 'well living support programme' for survivors and carers, and co-authored, with Professor McCaughan, a book entitled: 'Diagnosis & Treatment: The Journey of a Patient with Malignant Pleural Mesothelioma'. Jocelyn also contributed to the development of evidence based **Guidelines for the Diagnosis and treatment of Malignant Pleural Mesothelioma** published by ADRI in 2013. Jocelyn is also involved in the professional development of nurses and attended a Workshop for Health Professionals in Canberra on 19<sup>th</sup> September and is also part of the team developing Guidelines for Understanding Malignant Pleural Mesothelioma for patients and carers.

Utilising her knowledge and experience Jocelyn has provided a number of patients, carers and concerned family members with information and support, as well as a listening ear. She has held three 'meet and greet' mesothelioma support sessions and we anticipate the numbers for these sessions will grow as the message and success of the personalised support filters out to others. The established 'well living group' for survivors after extra-pleural pneumonectomy (EPP) will be facilitated from ADRI and generously funded by The Baird Institute.
